Special Policy Committee Meeting Minutes Monday, May 22, 2023 5:00 PM 501 Kings Highway East Superintendent's Conference Room

In attendance:

Ms. Jennifer Maxon-Kennelly, Ms. Jennifer Jacobsen, Ms. Carol Guernsey, Dr. Zakia Parrish (arrived at 5:10pm), Dr. James Zavodjancik (arrived at 5:12pm), Ms. Wendy Macchia

Call to Order: Ms. Maxon-Kennelly called meeting to order at 5:06 pm.

Approval of May 2, 2023 Policy Committee meeting minutes: Approved by 3 - 0 vote.

Ms. Maxon-Kennelly stated although the minutes indicate Policy 6163.33 – Service Animals/Therapy Dogs would not be implemented, the policy will be on future agendas as there currently are therapy dogs in some schools.

Policy:

Grading/Assessment Regulations

Dr. Zavodjancik reported there have been no issues with any of the regulations. Ms. Maxon-Kennelly asked where there is the biggest adjustment or learning curve. Dr. Zavodjancik stated not many need a learning curve, and most teachers are able to complete assessments and grade reporting on time. Dr. Zavodjancik reported compliance is self-reported by teachers and gradebooks are not pulled. Ms. Guernsey inquired what the process would be to build in oversight of these regulations. Dr. Zavodjancik reported assignments are not standard from class to class, there is not a way to look at a gradebook to determine if feedback is provided on time; there is no data inquiry that can be completed. Ms. Guernsey reported hearing there are issues with students not receiving prompt feedback or grades and is concerned, without some oversight, parents and students are set up for a difficult confrontation. Ms. Maxon-Kennelly suggested it is the house principals' responsibility to follow-up on compliance.

Ms. Guernsey inquired if parents find it helpful to be notified when their student is in the D/F range and if there has been positive feedback. Mr. Robert Smoler stated some parents are appreciative of

the notification. Ms. Maxon-Kennelly was interested in principals providing some anecdotal information. Ms. Guernsey stated it would be helpful for parents to have a line of communication.

Ms. Maxon-Kennelly suggested providing August PD time to familiarize staff with these regulations. Dr. Zavodjancik stated there is a plan in place for the start of the year.

Ms. Jacobsen expressed concern with the language about reducing available points for late work. Dr. Zavodjancik offered to research if points are being reduced to zero. Ms. Guernsey stated she believes this is happening. Ms. Jacobsen inquired if language could be changed to indicate that points cannot be reduced to zero. Dr. Zavodjancik stated there will be instances where this can be difficult based on the variety of rubrics used by teachers, but this is not the spirit in which this was written.

Draft Grading Preamble

The committee agreed the first three paragraphs of the Draft Grading Preamble were acceptable. Ms. Maxon-Kennelly stated the committee can commit to this wording with the option of making changes in future drafts if necessary. The committee recommended striking "at all grade levels, routine" and "at the elementary level" in bullet point #1, as well as replacing "conferences, at all levels" with "meetings". The committee recommended changing bullet point #7 to read "Ensure staff understanding and review of district grading practices and regulations." The committee recommended the first sentence of Option Two in the Grading Policy be placed in a new bullet point between bullet points #1 and #2 in the Draft Grading Preamble. The committee recommended striking the second sentence of the last paragraph as well as the word "Infinite" in the last sentence. The committee recommended this revised preamble replace options #1 through #4 in the current Grading Policy draft.

Grading Policy

Ms. Maxon-Kennelly inquired what the psychological impact was of cumulative grading. Dr. Zavodjancik reported hearing from principals at both high schools that students would prefer to stay with the current cumulative grading. Ms. Guernsey asked if students always know where they stand in terms of their grade. Mr. Robert Smoler stated there will be times this information is not available, for example when the portal is closed while teachers enter grades at the end of marking periods.

Weighted Grading

Ms. Jacobsen recommended the topic of weighted grading remain in the grading policy. Dr. Parrish stated there was a sentence missing in the first paragraph of the Weighted Grading section and referred to the sentence "The grade weighting system, developed by the administration, is subject to the approval of the Superintendent who shall then present the grade weighting system to the Board for its approval" in current Policy 6146.11. Dr. Zavodjancik stated the need for a future discussion regarding the grade weighting system. Ms. Jacobsen inquired if the standalone weighted grading policy should be eliminated and inserted in the grading policy. Dr. Zavodjancik reported the preference is to insert it into the grading policy and will follow up with this topic. The committee agreed to move ahead on this topic following Dr. Zavodjancik's future report.

<u>GPA</u>

Ms. Maxon-Kennelly suggested exempting PE and Health courses from GPA calculation. Ms. Jacobsen inquired if Health should remain in GPA calculation as it is an actual course. Ms. Guernsey

stated Health is as important as financial literacy. Mr. Robert Smoler stated PE is an important factor in a student's development. Dr. Zavodjancik will research a sample of the impact of PE on GPA. Ms. Jacobsen and Ms. Guernsey suggested, over a wide range of students, PE or Health grades could positively impact GPA. Dr. Parrish added both courses are a requirement for graduation. Mr. Robert Smoler suggested a Pass/Fail option. Dr. Zavodjancik will provide a data sample at a future date.

Consistency and Expectations

Ms. Jacobsen suggested the bulk of this section should be in regulations, not policy. Dr. Zavodjancik and Mr. Robert Smoler stated some of this language presents difficulty in implementation as there can be differences between classes in the same course. Dr. Zavodjancik stated there is consistency in curriculum, but likely some differences in implementation from one class to another. Ms. Jacobsen will craft philosophical language and requested suggestions for language for this section.

Zeros

Ms. Jacobsen and Ms. Guernsey recommended addressing this topic to ensure consistency between schools. Ms. Jacobsen requested administration provide direction on the 0/50 topic if this policy is not completed by next year. Mr. Robert Smoler stated there is nuance to this topic due to the subtle differences between students. Mr. Robert Smoler will conduct a survey before the June 5th meeting. Ms. Maxon-Kennelly will provide language for this section.

Middle School Honors

The committee agreed these honors need to be reinstated. Ms. Maxon-Kennelly will provide language for this section.

High School Honors

Ms. Maxon Kennelly will provide language for this section.

Open Discussion/Public Comment:

Mr. Robert Smoler was satisfied with his participation in the preceding dialogue.

Adjournment: Ms. Maxon-Kennelly adjourned the meeting at 7:00 pm

Dear Commissioner Charlene Russell-Tucker,

This is to provide an update on Fairfield Public Schools' Racial Imbalance Plan, as requested at the November 2, 2022, State Board of Education meeting. We continue to make progress on the components of our plan as outlined below. There has been little to update on the plan, but we anticipate a more significant update heading into the summer months because of the SLAM recommendations which will be presented to the Fairfield Board of education on June 13, 2023.

There are many factors that contribute to the current demographic enrollment at McKinley Elementary School. These include current housing and development, affordability, and the positive climate and culture that students and families experience at McKinley School. I cannot stress enough how much I have heard from families about how the school's culture has contributed to them seeking to move into the district specifically to enroll their children at McKinley. Families do not see a racially imbalanced school but rather an inclusive school community where their children are learning and growing.

The timeline below is a chronological account of the actions taken to date by the Fairfield Board of Education to begin the process of redistricting:

November 2, 2022: Fairfield Board Finance Committee: Costs/savings estimates from closing an elementary school, as discussed in September

November 15, 2022: Fairfield Board Discussion of Updated Facilities Planning Principles from 2010

November 29, 2022: Fairfield Board First Reading of Revised Facilities Planning Document

December 13, 2022: Fairfield Board adopts revised Facilities Planning Document. Review of 2019 Charge to Milone and MacBroom (SLAM) and Discussion of Updates, Timeline and Associated Budget

December 15, 2022: Fairfield Board holds Community Conversation regarding racial balance, academic excellence, and facility utilization in person.

December 21, 2022: Board Facilities Committee follow up on seating needs capacity for special programming and ECC, review of November enrollment and capacity data report from SLAM.

January 4, 2023: Fairfield Board held a Facility Planning Workshop. Review of Specialized Programming Request, First Reading of 2023 Board of Education Charge to Consultant, Timeline related to Facilities.

January 5, 2023: Fairfield Board holds Community Conversation regarding racial balance, academic excellence, and facility utilization virtually.

January 10, 2023: Fairfield Board meeting discussion on facilities capital planning, board follow up questions and amendments on the draft charge from January 4th the board voted to postpone the vote on the charge to the consultant to the January 24, 2023, Board meeting.

January 24, 2023: Fairfield Board Meeting: Board adopts charge to the consultant to assist in identifying redistricting scenarios to balance elementary school utilization and resolve racial imbalance.

Looking ahead, the district and Board of Education will be receiving the recommended scenarios from the SLAM consultants on June 13, 2023. The district will hold a public meeting as well as provide an online option to solicit input from the entire school community. The Board will participate in the first of a series of training opportunities around our district's equity work on May 24, 2023. I have made a significant investment in increasing our school climate initiatives, and ongoing community engagement efforts beginning this summer.
